

The Easter narrative in John's Gospel closes with these words: "Now Jesus did many other signs in the presence of his disciples, which are not written in this book. But these are written so that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that through believing you may have life in his name." (John 20: 30-31).

The words leave us with a "now what" kind of questioning and feeling. Having a new life in Jesus' name means what exactly?

For the emergence of what would become the church, post-resurrection was a time of waiting. It was a time of living a new life in Jesus' name, but also a time heavily focused on and ladened with the anticipation of Jesus' promised return.

The initial time after resurrection, was most likely filled with ecstatic hope. Jesus meant something to the people. Jesus had healed many of them of their physical and spiritual ailments. The holy and divine in Jesus had met people in the corners of life that were forgotten or purposely hidden. Jesus had empowered the marginalized, welcomed the rejected and given a fresh start to those who had been condemned to be forever defined by their frailties and faults.

Jesus meant something universal and powerful and yet very personal and tender to people. And this was the life they stepped into post-resurrection as they lived and waited for that power to appear again.

All these year's later, we still wait and wonder where Jesus is in our lives and world. In the time that has passed, too often we have made this religion in Jesus' name about the same oppressive religious rules and political power that Jesus condemned.

Now what? you may ask in the wake of another Easter celebration? Now we continue the work of waiting and of living new life in Jesus' name.

For the church today that means that we continue the rituals, the practices, the disciplines (praying, fasting, acts of service), that root our lives in that power that means something to us and to the world.

It also means that we can never stop thinking about how we share that new life and meaning in Jesus with others--not because we want them to believe a certain way or conform to a specific doctrine, but because we want people to know the power of Jesus that enriches and changes lives.

The Pew research center released a recent poll which asked respondents: how often do you attend church: at least once a week, once or twice a month/a few times a year, seldom/never. The findings were reported by state. In WA state, 30% reported attending once a week, 32% reported attending once or twice a month, and 38% reported seldom/never. (continued...)

This does not mean that people don't have spiritual longings, questions, or wonderings. It does mean that culturally people are not always starting with a church service (as was once the cultural expectation) as their first place of exploring those longings, questions, and wonderings.

Now what? We worship *and* we consider new ways in which we might connect people with the life-giving and life-changing power of Jesus. May God guide us as we continue that work.


