I have been contemplating the word trust. For health and wholeness to be present in the world, there must be some level of trust. By definition, trust is not an individual pursuit. It is built between the spaces of one person and another...between groups of people...between communities, states, countries.

I have been pondering when I have trusted another...when I have felt trust betrayed by another...when I have betrayed trust. The point of faith and believing is not to do all the right things to culminate in a prosperous end point. The point of faith and believing is that it is a process--one that unfolds everyday we are alive. And the process is paradoxically hard, terrible, beautiful and joyful. Its the work of seeing each other, of seeing God in the other, of caring about the needs of others, confessing and seeking forgiveness and reconciliation when we've hurt the other.

I have been thinking about my dad these past weeks. My dad was a musician. He was a piano tuner/rebuilder who owned his own business for 50 years. I grew up in the 1970s and 1980s. We didn't have cell phones, computers or cable TV. We had three channels and the public television station: KEDT, Corpus Christi. There were two shows that I got extremely excited about every week: Mutual of Omaha's Wild Kingdom and NOVA.

Wild Kingdom aired on a broadcast TV station and NOVA aired on PBS. Both shows introduced me to science, scientific inquiry and ushered me to places far away from my home and experience. I absolutely loved these shows and rarely missed watching them each week.

For years, my dad would donate free piano tuning services as part of the annual auction/fundraiser for KEDT. He worked the phone bank lines and was even interviewed one year by a local TV station. Dad was not a scientist, but he was curious and he passed that curiosity onto me and showed me the importance of supporting community efforts to educate.

Later, dad began listening to a particular radio talk show that pushed a mistrust of public broadcasting. and scientific inquiry. He stopped supporting the annual drive for public television, but he remained curious and fed that curiosity by (continued) reading National Geographic and watching the Animal Planet. He stayed curious until the end.


I am grateful to public goods and services like PBS that introduced me to so many things and made me curious about the world around me, especially the world outside of my own experience. This knowledge has never limited my trust in God but only expanded it. I have learned to trust God more as I have learned more about the beauty, intricacies, and expansiveness of God's generativity.

What is your story and experience of trust? Of trust earned, broken, restored? How can you begin to expand your trust?


God does not call us to a safe harbor of isolation from one another, but to a community of trust. How can we live into this calling? -Rochelle+


