

Kate Bowler was 35 when she was diagnosed with stage four colon cancer. She was at the pinnacle of her career as professor of the history of Christianity at Duke Divinity school. She was married and had a precious baby boy. Her diagnosis was grim, with only at 14% survival rate for those with the type of cancer she had. Her type of cancer was also rare, in that it was a subset within typology that could potentially respond to trial immunotherapy. Bowler explains that it was her connection with others that gained her access and the means to afford entering the trial treatment. She has responded well and nine years after her initial diagnosis, receives scans every six months to monitor for recurrence.

I have been so drawn to Bowler's story and work. She writes with a vulnerability and authenticity that we are taught to deny and hide. In my work as a minister and a chaplain I have seen the hard truth about our soft flesh and now, as a middle-aged human being, am understanding my own mortality. We are enculturated to deny this part of our existence, to always strive for happy and to push down any hint of melancholy or existential angst. I think this too is why I am drawn to Bowler's work--she gives permission and language to talk about this part of human life and she approaches it from a theological viewpoint I really resonate with.

In a 2022 interview with Maya Shankar, Bowler describes one of her research specialties as a historian of Christianity--the prosperity gospel. Bowler explains

that the prosperity gospel, sets up beliefs about the power of the mind to change your life. That if you have the right kind of positive words and the right kind of mental attitude (and as a budding Cognitive Behavioral Therapist, this gives me pause), that you can bring health and wealth and overall happiness, like during your life here on earth. And that's always the kind of like caveat because Christianity typically has a kind of asterisks beside is that says, yes, God is good. Yes. God is loving. Yes, God wants wholeness and love for you. but you may not get to see all of your hopes come to fruition, that all the good things then get kind of deferred to an afterlife. But the prosperity gospel has what we call like an over realized sense that all things will happen now for us who believe. So, it's a really incredibly confident set of beliefs that says that you don't need to suffer. You don't even need to be lucky because there will always be a way for you to figure out how to land on your feet."

And the problem is that good, faithful people won't always land on their feet. There are moments where things will not work out in a way that we feel "we deserve" when we are good, just, faithfully observant people.

And this leads me to crux of my personal theology-that God is love...that, as Jesus taught his disciples, others will know we are followers of Christ and that we love God by how we love. (Continued)... Bowler says, "I think the problem with the Everything Happens for a Reason is that hyper synthetic coherence that it demands that everything have. On the other hand, I do believe in a big story about love, in which in our worst moments, we are promised the love of one another, that we can show up and be the person that brings socks and dumb presents.

I have such an intense belief now that love is one of the only guarantees in the awful times...because on the other side of hyper causality is not nihilism or despair, its just more empathy for one another.

If we really know that there is not a fail-safe-rescue plan for everybody's pain, I think we would sure as hell show up a little faster for one another and believe in systems and good policies that prevent so much of human suffering in the first place.

We have outsourced solutions to each other's pain when we forgot that we belonged to each other. If we pour into each other the knowledge that you will never be really truly alone, that there is love waiting for you, I don't think we'll need quite so many reasons anymore."






