

"When he looked up and saw a large crowd coming towards him, Jesus said to Philip, 'Where are we to buy bread for these people to eat?' He said this to test him, for he himself knew what he was going to do. Philip answered him, 'Six months' wages would not buy enough bread for each of them to get a little.' One of his disciples, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, said to him, 'There is a boy here who has five barley loaves and two fish. But what are they among so many people?' Jesus said, 'Make the people sit down.' Now there was a great deal of grass in the place; so they sat down, about five thousand in all. Then Jesus took the loaves, and when he had given thanks, he distributed them to those who were seated; so also the fish, as much as they wanted." John 6: 5-11

When overwhelmed with a large task, or multiple tasks, or the overwhelming weight of all that is happening in the world, it is easy to feel like you don't know where to start or what to do. In my own life, this has led to season of procrastination and avoidance. I don't know where to start or what to do, so I simply don't do anything. Can you relate to this feeling?

When Jesus and the disciples were faced with a very large, hungry crowd, they were also faced with what seemed like a big, insurmountable problem--how do we feed all of these people when we have so little? Andrew, who is not often elevated as one of the more important disciples (indeed even here he is primarily identified as "Simon Peter's brother"), makes a crucial observation--there is a boy here with five barley loaves and two fish. A boy's lunch--what is that among so many?

Apparently the boy was willing to share his meager lunch and that meager lunch became the basis for one of Jesus' greatest and farthest reaching of miracles—the feeding of 5,000.

The chalice, the symbol of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) bears the cross of St. Andrew (who was reported to have been crucified on such a cross). The cross of St. Andrew is also a part of the flag of Scotland. It is a fitting symbol for our church as our founders were Scottish Presbyterians who, among other things, believed in open access to the Communion Table. The spiritual and physical feeding of people is core to who we are.

Among many things happening in our current environment is deep cuts from the federal government to community food banks. A current \$1 billion funding cut and spending freeze is impacting local food bank's ability to serve their communities which includes food bank operations and food assistance to local school districts. We historically have had two collection drives in our calendar year--one for the beginning of school and one for the Souper Bowl of Caring. We will likely add another spring food drive for the Sumner Food Bank to help with the shortfall. And you may be thinking, "how is my small contribution going to make a difference?" Always remember the little boy and his lunch. No gift is insignificant or too small. Giving just a little can have a lasting impact.

+Good Friday Tenebrae service of shadows: April 18 at 6 pm







Sunday, April 27<sup>th</sup> @ noon (after church)
