When I hit my 50's, I began to recognize my aging. One of those recognitions was that I don't completely understand the language of my children and their generation. I have taken to following the online videos of a middle school teacher whose mission is to decode the language of Gen Z. Its fascinating and has made me realize that my generation, too, had a cultural language that my own parents and elders probably didn't fully understand.

There are themes within language that transcend generational and cultural specificities. Beyond skibidi toilet (still trying to figure that one out), there are concepts like like love, generosity, compassion and caring, that Gen Z and all generations understand. Another of those words is sacrifice—a word that has fallen out of collective favor and use, but one that we all seem to understand at the core of our humanity. We don't achieve, attain, progress, succeed, advance without some amount of sacrifice.

Holy Week naturally brings us back to this foundational word as we ponder the sacrifice of Jesus on the cross and what it means. Sacrifice means to give something up, but not just any old thing. Sacrifice involves wholly letting go of something that is valuable and precious. In our Christian theology, we assert that God is in Christ--part of Christ as Christ is a part of God. And that God freely chooses to become one of God's own created in becoming human

in the person of Jesus. God is fully human and fully divine concurrently. And as such, God in Christ experiences all of the joys and delights of being human and all of the deep frustrations, sadness, pain and grief of being human.

Ultimately, God in Christ, does not utilize his power to gain the power of human institutions and government....God in Christ does not utilize his power to accumulate and acquire more material possessions and wealth...God in Christ, does not utilize his power to put others down and to oppress the marginalized. God in Christ utilizes his power to lay down his power, and ultimately his human life. He suffers oppression and dies a horrible death. Perhaps this sacrifice is, in part meant to show us, God's power with us, not over us--in the weakest, scariest, most vulnerable of times of life.

Perhaps one of the lessons being learned in these days is that activism void of sacrifice is not effective. When we stand up to power, we risk losing something, and perhaps even something that we count as valuable and precious. When I see people using their positions of power to oppress others while wearing diamond studded cross necklaces, I think we have lost our way...culturally we have forgotten the power and meaning of sacrifice.

God reminds this Holy Week, that love is made most real, most tangible, most effective, through sacrifice.

and spread the word!






Understanding Your Grief: 10 Essential Touchstones for Finding Hope and Healing in Your Heart


